## MOST OF THE AUDIENCE TAKES FILM PREMIERE AS SNOW JOB By Steve Ducklow

Michael Snow lives in a world where people speak backwards, guitars talk and a disappearing table returns only to remember its pain.

Ottawa, steeped in solemn grey reality, could never understand it. So a near capacity crowd of about 300 which went to the National Gallery Tuesday to see the world premiere of Snow's I2th film, "Rameau's Nephew by Diderot (Thanx to Dennis Young) by Wilma Schoen," dwindled to a hard—core audience of about 30 avant—garde film addicts by the time the four hour and 45 minute show was over.

Snow fired an arsenal of film—making techniques to distort reality to the limits of credibility, often losing the audience in what seemed a display of technical power for its own sake.

Underlying Snow's technique is his use of frames, building pictures with—in pictures until the image is lost. In films, the artist frames not only the image, but sound and time.

The film itself is the frame in which other frames are set, and the actual process of filming is constantly evident — periodically a hand sneaks in front of the camera to record a scene number.

Secondary frames are set as actors thrust microphones and spotlights at each other. In a dry monotone, a voice off—camera records the move—ments of two hands moving objects on a desk. "Now the left hand picks up the picture of the paino keys, turns it over, and adjusts it."

Like that of a play—by—play hockey announcer, the voice lags behind the movements, then suddenly speeds up, and the hands follow the dic—tates of the invisible commentator. Time becomes another frame. A lecture is delivered to teenagers on a bus: technology will eradicate the difference between subject and a facsimile, croaks the lecturer, and the species will observe itself.

Later technology is paraded with stunning force reducing human sounds and movements to patches of color and electronic squeals.

"This isn't natural," says a character at the beginning of that sequence, and while the four actors pick up the topic with a stream of intellectual—ized garbage, the camera moves closer to reveal the actors mouthing obscen—ities under their pre—recorded dialogue. The tape is played backwards while the film continues forward, but in black and white, and begins to move out of focus.

The voices are retracked and reproduced several times, each generation losing detail until the sounds become electronic squeaks and groans, surprisingly meaningful when superimposed over background city noises. Color returns as the screen flashes in time to the audio pulse and pieces of figures float by in a blur of passionate hues and rhythm, but the display is uniquely human and emotional, bathing the audience in sound and light. Each of the I2 sequences is almost physically disorienting, and Snow has interspersed them with soothing washes of pastel colors, one color following the next.

Actors talk in pompous non-sequiturs, each statement dripping with in-sight, making less sense than the solemn speech of one grave lecturer whose nonsense syllables are recorded backwards.

A guitar mutters quietly when a chord is struck, and a piano moans softly as hands stroke the keys. An actor opens his mouth to bleat the notes of a trumpet. ("I didn't know you could speak trumpet!")

A studious looking I2—year—old boy repeats: "What more evidence can there be than the evidence of the senses?"
