NONVIOLENT TONE

It is important that people planning to participate in the blockade understand the nature and reason for nonviolent actions at Earle Depot. We are attempting to stop the slaughter of our Indochinese sisters and brothers by placing ourselves between the ammunition and them. Unlike our government, we wish to prevent death and destruction, rather than inflict it on others. We cannot allow the government to shift the the responsibility for violence from themselves to the peace movement and will not be diverted by provocatuers who encourage violent confrontation. Because we want everyone, including the police and the military, to join us in our attempt to stop the killing, we will not provoke them by hostile words or namecalling. Nor will we respond violently to acts directed against us by those who oppose us. The integrity of our blockade is made clearest when, by our actions, we express the love and humanity that is so lacking at Earle Depot, a place of death.

THE THREE POINT PROGRAM FOR PEACE IN INDOCHINA

- 1. Within twenty-four hours of the Inauguration the next President will end all air, ground, and naval operations in Indochina.
- 2. Upon taking office, the next President will announce a date not later than April 20, 1973 by which the withdrawal from Indochina of all remaining U.S. personnel will be completed. The process of withdrawal will begin immediately, will be phased with the return of U.S. prisoners, and will be subject only to the reaffirmation by the other side of their commitment to safe conduct for withdrawing U.S. personnel.
- 3. The next President will announce on Inauguration Day that the United States will no longer finance the Thieu government or any government in Saigon that keeps tens of thousands of political prisoners in jail, suppresses opposition newspapers, harasses political meetings, or engages in other forms of repression which make a peaceful political accomodation in South Vietnam impossible. All aid to the regimes of South Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia which enables them to carry on the war will be terminated on February 20, 1973.

WEATHERMAN UNDERGROUND #12 was received by us at APPLESEED. It was dated May 19, 1972, the 82nd anniversary of the birth of Ho Chi Minh. The six-page communique discussed the war in Indochina and said: "Today we attacked the Pentagon, the center of American military command." Among the quotations from Ho was:

"Nothing is more precious than indpendence and freedom, and we would rather sacrifice all than lose our country and live as slaves."

This report is being reprinted in full in the current issue of Liberated Guardian.

Forced by the intensified discussion of the CONDITIONS OF LIFE on OUR LIMITED PLANET. POLITICIANS. GOVERNMENTS . CORPORATIONS, and INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS have begun to talk about the "human environment." With this title the United Nations is planning a huge conference to be held in Stockholm, Sweden, from June 5th to 16th. The conference will be visited by some 1200 delegates primarily politicians from more than a hundred countries. But politicians from all over the world, assembled for a couple of weeks in Sweden will not be able to solve the problems we face. What the politicians can do is to refer to FOGGY CLOUDS made by the EXPERTS and thus make many of us believe that the problams are too difficult for us to understand. As reflected already in the conference title, they will present a picture in which politicians heal the wounds of MAN'S ENVIRONMENT. while MAN HINSELF is left powerless and without a creative role. (Not to speak of WOMAN HERSELF who is completely forgotten in the whole pompous mess.) The politicians will formulate the ISSUES so that the task appears to be to MODIFY THE CONSEQUENCES of the current development rather than to CREATE A NEW WAY OF LIFE. They will present endless RESOLUTIONS to convince us and maybe even themselves that our future is IN GOOD HANDS. The "Message" from the Conference will be propagated all over the world. At least 500 journalists from newspapers, magazines, radio, and television will be present. OUR TASK IS CLEAR! Get together and do some THING during or before June 5th to 16th. Join these actions, which will be DECENTRALIZED. Every group in the world undertakes the kind of actions they prefer. and no one will act as international bureaucrats. In Stockholm many events are planned under the common name of POWWOW.
